What's the Difference between a Wiki and a Blog?

Simple definitions

Wiki: Non-linear, multiple author web page

Blog: Linear, single author web page (Blog = contraction of We**B-Log**)

In media/publishing terms, I tend to use the analogy that a **Blog is a one-to-many**, linear/chronological publishing tool (though I know readers can leave comments), whereas a **Wiki is a many-to-many**, always in-development dynamic publishing tool.

What's the difference?

A **wiki** is similar to a normal web site, but where every page has an edit button, and everyone by default is given permission to press the edit button.

A **blog** is a web site with mainly a single page, and that page displays individual announcements or "news items" in a latest-news-first order.

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Using a wiki at NTU

The university does not currently have use of wiki technology for learning and teaching, though this may change with the project for the VLP replacement. Instead there are several commercial organisations offering wiki hosting. PBwiki is a commercial service offering wiki technology & hosting that is supported within the college of Arts, Humanities & Education, because it offers the best combination of features for zero cost. Below you'll find a table showing several of the choices for wiki creation and hosting if you wish to explore other options.

PBwiki (http://www.pbwiki.com) appears to be the easiest way to get a wiki for your class or for yourself. For example, if you need a class web page, you could create it

in PBwiki in about half a minute and add a link to it from the VLP moments later. Below you'll find the pros and cons of using PBwiki within NTU.

How to use a Wiki for Learning

We would welcome more suggestions about how to use PBwiki/Wikis in learning & teaching, but here are some examples:

Students can produce information in a web page/site (not possible in VLP)

The audience can be as wide and open as is required (not possible in VLP), e.g. for dissemination outside NTU, in schools, etc.

Group Projects – Small groups collaboration (students if required can export the final web site as a MS Word file)

Tutor (and student) Assessment of contribution to a group project

Student sharing of information e.g. Recommended web sites, Shared collaborative Glossary – members adding to and editing the items in the glossary.

Individual projects - showing work in-progress - unlike a web journal or blog it allows for dynamic construction rather than a linear site.

Points to note:

All PBwiki sites require a password to edit them, but unless changed, all are open to be read by anyone. We recommend that unless openness is required, all PBwikis use password protection to read and edit. This may be particularly the case in group projects where information may not wished to be shared (with other groups) until post review or assessment.

PBwiki - Features & Functions

<u>PBwiki</u> is a wiki service that focuses on the education sector and as such has features and functions particularly suited for learning & teaching. How do I make a new page on my wiki?

You can add a new page by clicking the "New Page" button when viewing your wiki. The recommended way is to add a page is through your Point-and-Click editor. While editing, highlight the text that you want to make a link,

click the "Link" button and select "new page" under "Link to wiki page". The Point-and-Click editor only works in MS Internet Explorer and in Firefox.

How do I edit a page

All wiki pages that you can view are editable. At the top and bottom of every page you'll see an "Edit Page" button. Clicking on this will take you to the Point-and-Click editor, which will give you word processor-like editing tools. These include styling, tables, images, adding links (and emails) and attaching files.

How do I navigate through my pages?

You can navigate through your pages using the Sidebar. This is available on the right-hand side of every page and is completely editable like any other page. You can use this to create a navigational menu for your wiki site.

What you can & can't do

You can only read a page you have access to edit. Conversely, you can edit any page you can read. You also can't edit a page that someone else is currently editing. However if there has been no activity in the editing of that page for 5 minutes, you can "steal" the page to edit it. For further information about safety and security of PBwiki pages look at their Safety and security FAQ page

Can I be notified of any edits to a Wiki?

You can enable or disable notifications of any changes when you login to a wiki: Just tick the "Notify me of changes" checkbox located under your email address when you login. If the box is checked; you will be notified of changes anyone makes. If the box is not checked; you will not be notified.

The wiki administrator can change notifications through the "Settings" link, at the top of the page.

How do I manage multiple wikis?

We suggest setting up a <u>PBwiki identity</u> for both yourself and suggest that your students do the same. Having an identity makes it easy to manage your membership in a group of wikis, plus a central place for wiki access & to control notification settings for multiple wikis. Logging in with an identity means that all contributions/edits are trackable and attributable.

Should I have a public or private wiki?

A public wiki allows anyone to see your content, a private wiki is not accessible to the public. We would recommend making your wiki private, (under Settings > Access Controls), this way no-one could stumble across your or your students' wikis. In either case, however, a password is needed to edit your wiki. If you want students to be able to edit a wiki, simply share the password with them and they'll be able to make changes. You could also share, using the Share tool under Settings > Publicise/Monitor > Sharing.

Adding 'extras' to a page

You can add 'Table of contents' to a page, 'Number of vistors', or 'YouTube videos' by using the "Insert Plugin" button in the editor. These will take you

What else can I do with a PBwiki?

Let your students collaborate: They can use a PBwiki to do group work or create their own personal web page.

Demo your work: Use your PBwiki as an easy-to-create portfolio of the projects completed by your students. You can create an online slideshow to demo your work with one click.

Keep others informed: Set up a page in your PBwiki to update others on what your students are doing, or to update students on changes to your materials. It's live and editable any time.

What if one of my students posts something that's inappropriate?

If this happens, you can always go back to an earlier version of the wiki. PBwiki keeps all versions of a page, you can go back in time very easily, and you can see who made each change (if the user has logged in with an <u>identity</u> or name).

How much does it cost?

Setting up a PBwiki is free. A basic PBwiki comes with 10MB of storage space, unlimited pages, and the ability to welcome an unlimited number of visitors. If you'd like more features and storage space, PBwiki offer Premium wikis starting at \$10/month.

Is it easy to use?

Yes! It's as easy as making a peanut butter sandwich. It takes about 30 seconds to create and you can have a wiki up and running in about 5 minutes. PBwiki has templates to get you started.

Who controls the content?

Whoever has the password to your wiki can edit it. In other words, you control who gets access to the wiki, but once they're logged in, they can edit the wiki.

PBwiki Premium plans offer advanced features like access controls, which allow you to designate certain people as Readers and others as Contributors. You may also lock certain pages (like your syllabus) and hide others. You can upgrade to Premium any time, right from your wiki, by clicking the "upgrade" button at the lower left.

Can I make my wiki public or private?

Yes, you can make your wiki public or private, and no matter which you choose, a password is always required to edit your wiki - meaning only your password holders can make changes to your wiki.

Public: Anyone can access, password holders can edit **Private**: Password holders can only access & edit

Can I attach pictures or video clips?

Yes. In fact, you can add any type of file to any page in your wiki by clicking the "Files" button and uploading your files – though there is a 10MB limit for file storage. You can also link to pre-uploaded & found video such as YouTube using the *Insert Plugin* tool.

Can I monitor what happens on my wiki?

Yes, you can choose to be notified by email of every change that's made to your wiki.

Is my data safe? Can I back up my pages?

NTU has no links with PBwiki however PBwiki states that data is backed up hourly, and you can get 1-click backups right from your wiki from the "**Settings**" menu.
